
Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Three diocesan priests reflect on priesthood

There are currently 13 active diocesan priests with at least 20 years of priestly ministry to the Diocese of Evansville.

Three of those 13 active priests are

Father Zach Etienne, Father Tony Ernst and Father Paul Ferguson. All three priests are currently pastors at their respective parishes.

Father Zach Etienne is currently the pastor at Good Shepherd Parish in Evansville, a role he has held since 2010. He was ordained in June 2004

and his other assignments included stops at St. Joseph Parish in Jasper and St. Mary Parish in Ireland. He is also the Dean of the South Deanery.

Father Etienne grew up in Tell City, which is close to St. Meinrad Seminary. He said his mother grew up in a family of nine kids, with two of her siblings

choosing religious life. He said growing up, they constantly had priests and nuns around, which allowed them to know not just the holy life they were supposed to lead but also the down to earth kind of people they were.

What Are Indulgences?

The "Catechism of the Catholic Church" defines an indulgence as "a remission

By MATT MILLER before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven" (No. 1471). Through indulgences, the infinite merits of Christ, as well as the merits of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the saints, are applied to our purification in this life or the life to come. An indulgence may be either plenary (full or complete), removing all of the temporal punishment due to sins, or they may be partial. Those obtaining an indulgence can choose to apply it either to themselves or to the souls of deceased persons. In the case of the Jubilee Indulgence, if it is being applied to the deceased,
